The Tennessee State Scholarship Committee reminds chapter presidents to encourage members to apply for a State Scholarship. The updated **Scholarship Application form** is attached and is available on the state website (xistate.org) under *Resources/Forms&Applications/Scholarship*. The deadline to apply is February 1, 2020.

The Vision Foundation offers grants to help with an educational project, publication of educational research, or professional development opportunity. Active teachers or schools who want to incorporate an educational project into their classrooms should apply for a **Vision Foundation Project Grant**. The grants offer up to \$1,000 each for projects.

The Liz Whorley Bradley Professional Growth Award offers up to \$2,000 to attend a professional development conference or training.

#### A Note from Patsye Thurmon

On vacation at the beach at the end of October, about four days in, my knee went OUT. It wouldn't straighten, and it was very painful, and basically I had to walk a bit like an ape to get around. (Luckily for me, it rained the last few days there, or I would have been even more miserable.). At the airport they got me a wheelchair and had one waiting for me when we landed in Knoxville. I had crutches at home and used those to get to the orthopedist on that Monday. They removed two syringes of fluid from my knee and gave me a steroid shot, which worked within 48 hours. The end of the problem, I thought.

THEN we went to West Tennessee a couple of days later for a short two-day trip, since we'd missed seeing our parents in October (both sets of parents are still living). I went to an optometrist in Dyersburg the next day, because some floaters in my eye were obstructing my vision by now. After several tests, he told Larry that he needed to rush me to Memphis right that minute, that I had a severely detached retina. We hurried down to the Charles Retina Institute, scares to death, where they were so kind and reassuring, and put a gas bubble in my eye, hoping it might solve the problem and allow them to just do some minor laser trimming on Monday. Also, I would have to sleep face downwards and try to keep my chin tucked into my chest and NOT look upwards.

Well, to make an overly long story a bit shorter, all it did was to keep the detachment from worsening, so I was scheduled for eye surgery on Wednesday at the Hamilton Eye Institute, a UT adjunct in Memphis. It was successful, we think, but I've had to continue with this uncomfortable head positioning for two weeks and a half now, though I plan to call my doctor today with some questions, one of which is to ask if I can finally sleep on my side, at least. So our two-day trip turned into a week and a half, plus the steroid shot in my knee did not last. I had two or three days of pain in Dyersburg with that, in the middle of the whole eye deal, and then the knee pain somehow cleared up.

I see my doctor in Memphis again on Dec. 5, so we will be headed back that way again pretty soon after we've returned from Thanksgiving over there. The knee acted up again last week for a couple of days during my eye recovery here in Clinton, causing severe pain before it miraculously cleared up again, so when I've got the eye taken care of, I suppose I'll be looking at knee surgery; I have another appointment with the orthopedist in January.

So I'm just basically falling apart and have had to put everything on hold for the entire month of November. I hope I'm able to join you ladies in December. I miss everybody!
