Pi Chapter Members Attend Legislative Symposium in Nashville



Our annual Legislative Symposium was held in Nashville on February 13th and 14th. Like much of Anderson County during that time, our delegation was down two members due to illness. Pi President Rhonda Phillips, April Perry and Kelly Raye Williams were able to attend. The symposium offered a small but effective panel discussion on the night the 13th with Donna Cotner, from TRTA and Rep. Harry Brooks. Valentine's Morning we were treated to a lovely devotional and listened to Commissioner McQueen. Then

we headed to the hill for an action packed day. Breaking into teams, we were able to meet with Representatives Brooks, Calfe, Dunn, Ragan and Smith as well as our new Lt. Governor McNally.

Kathleen Benedict did provide lovely spice tea packets that we were able to present to our legislators as we met with them. While our meetings were enjoyable, I left the symposium realizing the vast amount of work and communication concerning protecting public education that lies ahead of this legislative season.

The PIE (Policy Innovators in Education) is growing in Tennessee. They strongly support charter schools and choice school programs (by any other name vouchers). There are some hurtful legislative bills currently in committee that we need to watch carefully. I will work with the legislative committee to have list of those bills available to the chapter at our monthly meeting on the 7th.

However, I feel that we must keep a watchful eye on Washington now and in the years to come. There is currently a resolution (HR 610) that will drastically effect all education in our country K-12. I cannot see any redeeming qualities to this resolution; it effective eliminates The Elementary and Secondary Schools Act of 1965 and the No Hungry Child Act and totally ignores provisions for FAPE while placing most if not all federal funding in grant programs.

Please remember how important it is to stay aware of what is happening on Capitol Hill and to continually voice what we think is best for our students and public education in our state and country.
